

A quick glance at the activities for 2011 is seen on page 9.


I strongly encourage members to join the activities of the ISD, and there are many ways to do so:

Preya Kullavanijaya: First Southeast Asian Maria Duran Medalist

The firsts are always special. The first house, the first born, the first car, the first trip abroad, these are always memorable and special.

Former Director of the Institute of Dermatology, President of Dermatological Society of Thailand and Chairperson of the Asian Dermatological Association, Dr. Preya Kullavanijaya became the first Southeast Asian to be awarded the prestigious International Society of Dermatology (ISD) Maria Duran medal. Dr. Preya, as she is fondly called, is currently Advisor to the Ministry of Public Health's Department of Medical Services and to the Institute of Dermatology and serves as Chair of the Thai Board of Dermatology Training and Examination. Dr. Preya joins the short list of medalists given by ISD since 2002 (Refer to the complete list on page 5).

The prestigious Maria Duran Medal is given to honor the memory of the late Dr. Maria M. Duran (Colombia), who was Secretary-General of the ISD for 10 years then Executive Vice-President. Dr. Duran's dedication, selflessness and concern for women and children earned her much admiration and respect among her colleagues at home and abroad.

The 2010 Maria Duran medals were given to two wonderful women: Dr. Inderjeet Kaur (India) and Dr. Preya Kullavanijaya (Thailand). The former received her medal in New Delhi last January while the latter was awarded during a formal ceremony at the Regional Congress of Dermatology held in Kota Kinabalu, Sabah, Malaysia last October.

Dr. Kullavanijaya's path in Dermatology started with her Clinical Attachment to Dr. Brian Russell's Dermatology Clinic at North Middlesex Hospital, London, England, in 1968. Three years later, she earned her Diploma in Dermatology at the Institute of Dermatology, St. John's Hospital for Diseases of the Skin in

London, and by 1978, she became a Research Fellow at the Contact Dermatitis Clinic of the same hospital. She then became a Diplomate (Thai Medical Board of Dermatology) by 1984 and a year after, she earned her Fellowship to the Royal College of Physicians (FRCP) Thailand. Her meritorious drive prospered and in 1995, she had her Master's Degree from Thailand's National Defense College and Honorary Doctorate Degree in Medical Science, (DScMed) at Mahidol University. At present, she is a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians in London (FRCP), Tokyo's Juntendo University School of Medicine, the American Dermatological Association and the Japanese Dermatological Association.

Her excellence in the field of dermatology was recognized by various local and international organizations. Her achievements through her leadership, research capabilities and service to her patients and colleagues did not go unnoticed through the years. Significantly, she was bestowed the Outstanding Lady Award, Government Sector (2001) by no less than Princess Somsawalee at Sukothai Palace. Her educational leadership as a member of the Editorial Board of the JAAD (2004-2008) was recognized in 2008 and most recently (2009), the ILDS appreciated her outstanding achievement in Dermatology.

Dr. Preya has authored six Thai dermatological books, 54 publications in Thai medical journals, and 40 publications in international medical journals.

Congratulations, Dr. Preya! We value your work, we admire your persona, and we salute your contribution to dermatology!

A “drop in the ocean” turning into a “seed”

Report on the Fourth International Congress
Dermatological Care for All: Awareness and responsAbility
9-12 November 2010, Ethiopia

At the end of the Congress, in Mekelle, I was telling Bernard Naafs about my terrible disappointment, on returning to Europe after 34 years of work as a doctor in Africa, for having done nothing practically useful for prevention in the long term, and I ended the conversation with the usual expression “just a drop in the ocean...”. I was really impressed by Bernard’s simple reply: “But that was not a drop, you should call it a *seed*”. These few words, besides giving me a glimmer of hope about my work, made me feel that there could not have been anything better than the interesting and successful Congress that just ended to prove that “drops” can turn into “seeds” and start producing fruit, showing in practical terms what can be done to achieve tangible results under extremely difficult conditions.



As it had already happened for the first three meetings, a very interesting aspect of the Congress was the presence of other specialists in various fields, coming from different parts of the world. The fact that having the participation of a psychiatrist, as well as of a surgeon/oncologist, two gynecologists, general practitioners, anthropologists, psychologists and sociologists to contribute to the variety of presentations and subsequent discussions at the meeting, showed the importance given to a combined effort in dealing with the health problems of an individual as a whole.

On the first day in Addis Ababa, we were shown an interesting video-conference on AIDS and Global Health, sent by Stefano Vella (Italy). This was followed by a talk given by Sidney Klaus

on the problem of emerging or re-emerging infectious diseases. Terence Ryan presented the problem of water shortage, suggesting a new technology for making water fit for drinking. Claire Fuller dealt with vulvar dermatoses and Mossy foot (Podoconiosis) prevention. Stefano Veraldi (Italy) showed a colour atlas of diseases of the vulva and genital area, and Lucia Romani spoke about her experience on the treatment and prevention of scabies, apparently a potentially very serious disease on the Fiji Islands. Moreover, an extremely interesting Photography Exhibit was organized at the Italian Cultural Institute by NIHMP, with the purpose of presenting the activities of the Italian Dermatological Centre (IDC) at Ayder Hospital in Mekelle and to feature aspects of Ethiopian culture and daily life, particularly in the Tigray Region.

During the following days in Mekelle, speakers on dermatological issues were Ben Naafs who talked about the Differences between White and Black skin and Leprosy, a forgotten disease; Ingvar Lengstam (Sweden) on Cryosurgery; Christoph Geilen (Germany) on Kaposi's sarcoma; D.N. Shimelis (Ethiopia) on a rare case of a patient with signs of primary and secondary syphilis. The Congress ended with a video-documentary, an excursus through the social and health activities of the NIHMP – San Gallicano Hospital from Rome to Mekelle, not only on the activities carried out at the Ayder Hospital, but also about other initiatives, particularly those in favour of neglected children. This is the case of “Casa di Ersilia” where minors in situation of vulnerability and without family support are provided with safe housing and taken care of.

ISD Mentorship Program: A Lesson in Humanistic Medicine

ISD mentorship awardee and dermatology resident Dr. Raja K. Sivamani of Sacramento, Calif. (USA), gained a new perspective on time and distance after spending a month in New Delhi, India, in the Dermatology Department at the All India Institute of Medical Science (AIIMS) with Dr. V.K. Sharma as his mentor.

The AIIMS is a quaternary care research medical center – subsidized by the Indian government – that receives referrals from throughout India and provides free care to patients. Many of their patients are very, very poor and would commute from hundreds to a thousand kilometers away and travel by train, rickshaw and foot for a dermatology visit.

Dr. Sivamani had the opportunity to see many medically complicated diseases – from leprosy to systemic amyloidosis, post kala-azar dermal leishmaniasis to cutaneous TB, Reiter's disease to florid pemphigus. He noted that working within the financial means of the patients was a must for compliance, and something that the faculty at AIIMS did very well.

“My month at AIIMS opened my eyes to the power of medical dermatology and how it can truly change a life. One thousand kilometers and ten minutes represented the independence that the patients gained from their diseases so that they could maintain their integrity and pride and continue to be productive in their communities. It is a lesson that has changed my perspective of medicine immensely.”

For example, Dr. Sivamani explained how they would turn a florid case of pemphigus around and keep the patient under long-term control with outpatient medications that the patient could afford despite their poverty. For patients, the long trek for a 10-minute, follow-up dermatology visit meant the difference between providing for their families or, as he noted, becoming trapped in their disease.

Grateful to the entire faculty at AIIMS, especially Dr. Sharma for serving as his mentor and Dr. M. Ramam for organizing the details of his trip, Dr. Sivamani cannot wait to return to India one day.

Travel Award to Honor the Contributions of Dr. Marshall Blankenship to International Dermatology

In conjunction with the Tropical Dermatology Seminar organized by the University of Chicago Section of Dermatology and supported by the Chicago Dermatological Society, ISD is pleased to announce the Marshall Blankenship Travel Award to a resident, fellow or young practicing dermatologist or dermatologist in-training who is 35 years old or younger to attend the meeting from April 15-16, 2011, in Chicago.

Dr. Marshall Blankenship, now retired in his hometown of Chicago, served as an ISD Vice President, Board Member and in numerous voluntary positions including implementing the ISD web site. During his career, he was a strong advocate of international dermatologic education and served as Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation for International Dermatologic Education. This award is offered in the spirit of fostering the next generation of leaders in global dermatology.

The purpose of the travel grant program is to help defray costs of travel and registration to the meeting, and the award will be given in the amount of \$1,000.00 (US). In addition, the registration fee will be waived. To qualify, applicants must be traveling from outside the U.S. and Canada.

The travel grant will be given to the successful applicant upon his or her arrival at the meeting by Dr. James Ertle, member, ISD Board of Directors.


The scholarship recipient is responsible for making his or her own travel and hotel arrangements.

Applicants must meet the following requirements to be considered for the Travel Award:

- Must be enrolled in a residency program at the time of the meeting (and 35 years of age or younger) or young dermatologists under the age of 35 at the time of the meeting. A copy of the applicant's passport and page stating name and age must be submitted at the time of the application.
- Must submit a personal statement indicating why the applicant should be selected. ISD must also receive a letter of recommendation, preferably from the applicant's present or former training director, by the application deadline.
- Preference will be given to an applicant who has not previously been awarded an ISD scholarship.
- Apply online at www.intsocderm.org. All applications must be submitted online by February 15, 2011.
